# LIFELINE MITTS INFO

## **YARN**

Fingering to chunky weight yarn.

Use table on page 3 as a guide to approximate yardage for your size, but be aware that this is only a rough guide.

Details for the yarn used for the samples can be found on page 4.

## **GAUGE & SWATCHING**

This pattern includes multiple gauges, so that you can use the gauge you get with your chosen yarn. Before casting on your mitts I recommend knitting a swatch of st st in the round.

The suggested needle size for your yarn should be a good starting point. If there isn't one refer to the table below for suggested needle sizes and a gauge range to aim for with standard yarn weights. If you know you usually need to size up or down needles you might want to start with a smaller or larger needle than is recommended.

### To knit a quick swatch for projects in the round:

Cast-on enough stitches to give you 3" / 7.5cm using the suggested gauge for your yarn. Do not join in the round. Knit across, \*then slide the stitches back to the other end of the needle without turning. Bring the yarn across the back of the work and knit across all stitches again. Rep from \* until your swatch measures approx 3" / 7.5cm.

Wash and block your swatch before measuring your gauge.

Take a moment to assess the fabric of your swatch. If you're happy with how it feels, measure how many stitches you have over the centre 2" / 5cm and divide the result by two. You'll use this number to find your row in the multi-gauge tables in the pattern (see page 3).

## **NEEDLES**

Dpns or circulars for your preferred method of working small circumferences in the round in the size you swatched with.

For the ribbed edgings option: A second set of dpns or circulars for your preferred method of working small circumferences in the round 2 sizes smaller.

This pattern can be used for any method of knitting small circumferences in the round.

The mitts are knit in the round, with a stitch count that won't fit comfortably around standard circular needles. This means that you'll need to use a special method for knitting small circumferences in the round. The traditional option is a set of double pointed needles. Longer circulars can be used for the "magic loop" or "two circulars" techniques.

If you're a newer knitter and haven't yet tried any of these techniques practice on a swatch in a yarn that's double knitting weight or thicker. Once you've decided which technique to use for your mitts stick with that method throughout.

Stitch markers, scrap yarn.



## FOLLOWING THE PATTERN

When the different size and gauge combinations in the pattern require you to use different numbers, the information is presented in a table. Find your gauge in the left column of the table (in stitches per inch / 2.5cm) then follow across to the column for your size.

Eg: if my gauge is 8.5 sts per inch and I want to knit size F I'll find my gauge and size in the table of caston st counts and know I need to cast on 72 sts. I recommend circling or highlighting the numbers that apply to your size and gauge before beginning.


